Reported Speech

When a person talks, the words they say are called *direct speech*. The person speaking is giving some information, giving a command, or asking a question. If another person wants to tell somebody else what the original person said or asked, then they use *reported speech*. *Reported speech* is telling another person what someone else said. For example, there are three friends at a restaurant; Bob, Susan, and Kathy. Bob uses *direct speech* and says, "I love this restaurant." Susan does not hear what Bob said so she asks Kathy to tell her what Bob said. Kathy uses *reported speech* to tell Susan what Bob said by saying, "He says that he loves this restaurant."

Reported speech always uses a **report verb** such as "say," "tell," or "ask." When the **report verb** is used in the **simple present tense** ("say," "tell," "ask."), then the **reported speech** should be in the **simple present tense**. If the **report verb** is in the **simple past tense** ("said," "told," "asked"), then the **reported speech** must follow a special **verb tense** rule.

Direct Speech to Reported Speech Present Tense Report Verb

When using *reported speech* with a *present tense report verb*, the *tense* of the *verb* in the *reported speech* does <u>not</u> change. For example, the *direct speech verb* is *simple present tense* and the *report verb* is *present tense* so the *reported speech verb* stays as *simple present tense*. Additionally, if a *modal verb* is used in *direct speech*, then it must also be used in the *reported speech*. Remember that *modal verbs* do not have a *tense* but they are used in *reported speech* to help show the *tense* or make the speech more formal.

When using the *present tense* for *reported speech*, it is more common to use the *report verb* "say" than it is to use "tell" or "ask," but all three are OK to use.

Direct Speech to Reported Speech Past Tense Report Verb

When using **reported speech** with a **past tense report verb**, the **tense** of the **verb** in the **reported speech** changes depending on what **verb tense** is used in the **direct speech**. For example, if the **direct speech verb** is **simple present tense**, then the **reported speech verb** is changed to **simple past tense**. Additionally, many of the **modal verbs** are changed to help show that the speech is actually **reported speech**. Remember that **modal verbs** do not have a **tense** but they are used in **reported speech** to help show the **tense** or make the speech more formal.

| Is that a good movie? | asked | They asked if that was a good movie. |

The chart below shows how each *direct speech verb tense* changes when used with a *past tense report verb*. Be careful because sometimes the *reported speech verb tense* does <u>not</u> change.

| SIMPLE PRESENT "I <mark>need</mark> a vacation." | SIMPLE PRESENT | She <mark>says</mark> she <mark>needs</mark> a vacation. |

| PRESENT CONTINUOUS "We are cooking dinner." | PAST CONTINUOUS | They <mark>told</mark> me they <mark>were cooking</mark> dinner. |
| PRESENT PERFECT "Yuuki <mark>has taken</mark> the test." | PAST PERFECT | He <mark>said</mark> that Yuuki <mark>had taken</mark> the test. |
| PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS "This movie has been exciting." | PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS | He told us the movie had been exciting. |
| SIMPLE PAST "Who <mark>ate</mark> the pizza?" | PAST PERFECT | She <mark>asked</mark> who <mark>had eaten</mark> the pizza. |
| PAST CONTINUOUS "The car <mark>was stopping</mark> every hour." | PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS | They <mark>said</mark> that the car <mark>had been stopping</mark> every hour. |
| PAST PERFECT "They <mark>had come</mark> home." | PAST PERFECT (NO CHANGE) | Yuuki <mark>told</mark> us they <mark>had come</mark> home. |
| PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS "We had been eating earlier." | PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS (NO CHANGE) | Somebody <mark>told</mark> us they <mark>had been eating</mark> earlier. |
| WILL "I <mark>will</mark> sleep now." | WILL (CASUAL) WOULD (FORMAL) | Joe <mark>said</mark> he <mark>will</mark> sleep now. Joe <mark>said</mark> he <mark>would</mark> sleep now. |
| CAN " <mark>Can</mark> you pass the test?" | CAN (CASUAL) COULD (FORMAL) | I <mark>asked</mark> if you <mark>can</mark> pass the test. I <mark>asked</mark> if you <mark>could</mark> pass the test. |
